Humanities

The main focus of the topic will be to understand a significant historical event of the past through learning about The Great Fire of London. We will use a range of sources of information to help us do this including paintings and diary entries from the time. The concept of chronology will be developed through the use of timelines. We will explore the impact of the Great Fire of London on modern life

This term the children will design, evaluate and bake a 1666 biscuit, using the ingredients they had at the time. They will do some market research to find out what people prefer for taste and texture and use that to make a truly excellent biscuit!
